<p>In a daring gamble to halt the Allied advance into Germany, Adolph Hitler cannibalized his war machine to create two new Panzer armies. Waiting for bad weather to cut the American forces in Belgium off from their supply routes, on December 16, 1944 the Nazis surprised Allied commanders by pushing a bulge into the advancing Allied army. In the city of Bastogne, the 101st Airborne under the command of General Anthony McAuliffe was surrounded, out numbered, and facing the rapid depletion of their last remaining supplies. Facing not only the determined enemy but a harsh winter, their plight seemed hopeless—a situation the Germans were well aware of. The enemy commander sent a demand for surrender of the American forces to General McAuliffe. The intrepid leader responded with one word...."NUTS!" 

For 5 days, the already battle-weary 100 th /442d Regimental Combat Team, consisting almost exclusively of Japanese-American soldiers, fought their way to the rescue. Breaking through on October 30 th , the brave Nisei suffered more than 800 casualties to rescue the 211 trapped and outnumbered soldiers of the <i>Lost Battalion</i> .

<p>On August 7, 1942 United States Marines opened the first major American offensive in the Pacific on a small island in the Solomons known as Guadalcanal. Within two weeks a vital airfield, named for Major Lofton Henderson who had been killed at Midway, was completed and on August 20th the first group of Marine fighter planes arrived. Those nineteen wildcats paved the way for others to follow in the month of September, and throughout the fall of 1942. Nicknamed the "Cactus Air Force", the pilots flying out of Henderson field played a vital role in the ultimate victory in the Solomon Islands and left behind a legacy of unprecedented victory and valor in the skies over the Pacific. <p>Code named <i>Operation Overlord</i>, the June 6, 1944 assault on the beaches at Normandy on the northwest coast of France was the largest amphibious assault in history. On the first day more than 150,000 men crossed the English channel in more than 11,000 ships to breach Hitler's Atlantic Wall. Following pre-dawn glider and parachute drops behind the beaches, British forces landed at beaches code named Sword and Gold, Canadians forces at Juno. American soldiers stormed the beaches code named Omaha and Utah, fighting inland to liberate France. Less than 90 days later the Allied Forces marched triumphantly into Paris. Lieutenant Colonel Jimmy Doolittle proved what the Japanese would have never dreamed possible, that heavy bombers could take off from the small deck of an air craft carrier. On April 18, 1942 the <i>USS Hornet</i> slipped within 668 miles of Tokyo to launch Lt. Col. Doolittle and his sixteen B-25 bombers in a daring daylight raid to bomb Tokyo, Nagoya, Osaka and Kobe on the Japanese mainland. All 16 bombers were lost in the mission. Of the 80 volunteers, 3 were killed and 8 were captured. (Of the 8 captured, 3 were later executed and one starved to death in a POW camp.) Still, it was a moral victory for the United States and put the enemy on notice that their homeland was vulnerable.

<p>Early in the Civil War, 21 young volunteers joined civilian spy James Andrews, in a daring raid deep into the South. There they captured a Confederate locomotive and began their return north in a desperate race that is now known as <i>The Great Locomotive Chase</i>. The effort failed, all were captured. Six soldiers along with their leader were executed. A year after the daring raid, six of the brave Union soldiers were released in a prisoner exchange. Arriving in Washington, D.C. on March 25, 1863 they became the first Americans to be awarded the Medal of Honor. <p>On Sunday morning, December 7, 1941 two waves of Japanese airplanes launched a surprise attack on the US Naval Base at Pearl Harbor Hawaii. In less than an hour 4 American battleships were sunk, 5 left damaged or sinking. 200 planes were destroyed on the ground. In all, 2,388 American sailors, soldiers, Marines and civilians were killed. Fifteen men received Medals of Honor for heroism that day, 10 of them sacrificing their lives in their moment of heroism. (One of the surviving 5 Medal of Honor heroes was later killed in action.) Today only John Finn remains to call to mind the sacrifice and heroism of that day. THE MEDAL OF HONOR

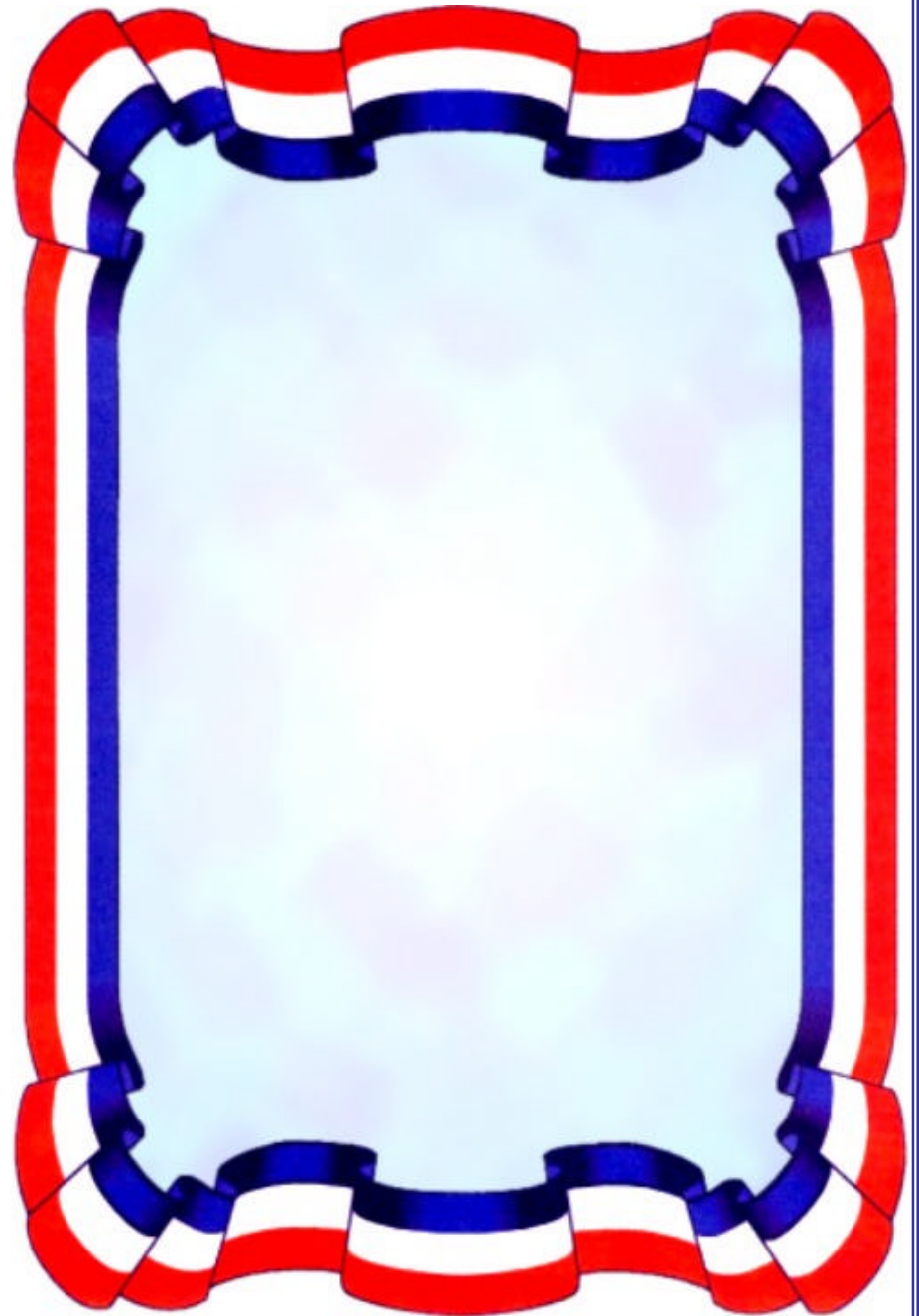


The Medal of Honor, often referred to as the Congressional Medal of Honor, is our Nation's highest award for military heroism.

It is awarded only for the highest degree of valor while in Military service against an armed enemy of the United States. Though more than 40 million Americans have served our Nation in uniform since the birth of the United States in 1776, only 3,452 Medals of Honor have been awarded. These heroes are our own unique *Knights of the Round Table*, men of immense loyalty and patriotism who risked their lives in the defense of freedom, and now continue to give of their lives to promote patriotism and inspire other Americans in the spirit of sacrifice and service.

Since the beginning of World War II, only 837 soldiers, sailors, Marines, and airmen have been awarded the Medal of Honor. Nearly two thirds of them died in their moment of heroism. On Veterans Day, 2000 when the Freedom Calendar became available, only 151 of these TRUE heroes remained. To these heroes, who serve to remind us of ALL the men and women who have risked and given all to secure the blessings of liberty, we dedicate this calendar. May God bless them throughout the coming year, and may God Bless America.
