Rotate Orientation Page 90 degrees so Arrow is REVERSED
Insert FACE UP in your paper tray as seen above
REMOVE THIS ORIENTATION PAGE
Then print the Calendar_2 File

If for some reason when you print Calendar_1 the orientation arrow is pointing the opposite direction from the view seen in STEP 1 above, simply reverse the process as shown at the right.

Vietnam War American Casualties Killed in Action – 291,557 Other Deaths – 10,788 Wounded – 153,303 POW/MIA – 2,596 Unaccounted for – 1,905	The Vietnam War (January 1, 1961 – August 14, 1974) American Advisors began service in Vietnam in 1955, seven years before the Gulf of Tonkin Resolution authorized the buildup that eventually saw 2 ½ million Americans committed to combat in Southeast Asia. The 3-year span noted by authorization for the National Defense Service Medal alone makes it our longest war—lengthened further when one reviews the war as an extension of the Cold War that precipitated it. The dedication of those who fought in Vietnam is well represented by the 245 Americans who earned Medals of Honor, 154 of whom died in their moment of valor. Korean War (June 25, 1950 – July 27, 1953) The Korean War, provoked when 90,000 Communist soldiers of the <i>Inmin Gun</i> swept into South Korea in the predawn hours of June 25, 1950, was one of the deadliest wars in our history. In three short years of bitter combat, waged in some of the world's most inhospitable terrain and during untenable weather, 131 soldiers, sailors, airmen and marines earned Medals of Honor. 

It was a global war with battles in Europe, the Pacific, and even the Territory of Alaska. Sixteen million American men and women served in uniform, suffering nearly a million casualties. More Americans earned Medals of Honor (464) than in any war since the Civil War, and for the first time in history posthumous awards (266) outnumbered presentations to living heroes. Perhaps the inscription on the base of the Iwo Jima memorial best characterizes the American spirit throughout the war... "Uncommon Valor was a Common Virtue".

With out prospect of relief, I feel it is my duty to my Country, and to my gallant troops, to end this useless effusion of blood and human sacrifice. 

World War I American Casualties Killed in Action – 53,402 Other Deaths – 63,114 Wounded – 204,002 POW/MIA – 7,323 Unaccounted for – 3,350	World War I (April 6, 1917 – November 11, 1918) World War I began in Europe on July 28, 1914 though the United States remained neutral in <i>The War to End All Wars</i> for three years. When at last American doughboys were sent to France, it was to find the Allied Powers at a stalemate. Most American involvement in actual combat occurred after Germany's spring offensive of 1918. General Pershing's American Expeditionary Force crushed that offensive, then fought valiantly to push the enemy back to the Siegfried Line. Spanish-American War American Casualties Killed in Action – 385 Other Deaths – 2,061 Wounded – 1,662	Spanish-American War (April 22, 1898 – February 6, 1898) In the first three months of America's <i>first expansionist war</i> the US Navy destroyed the once legendary Spanish fleet in both the Pacific and the Caribbean. On the ground in Cuba, Puerto Rico, and the Philippine Islands US soldiers and marines defeated the Spanish soldiers, earning independence for Cuba and acquiring both Puerto Rico and Guam as possessions. Union Casualties Killed in Action – 140,414 Other Deaths – 224,097 Wounded – 281,881 Confederate Casualties Killed in Action – 74,524 Other Deaths – 59,297 Wounded – 137,102	The American Civil War (April 14, 1861 – April 9, 1865) Our Nation's costliest war pitted brother against brother in the greatest test of the survival of the union established less than 100 years earlier. The 4-year struggle pitted more than 2,213,363 Union soldiers against 1,050,000 Confederate troops, and resulted in nearly a million casualties (dead or wounded). Other deaths (from disease, prison camps, etc.) brought the total death toll to nearly a half-million. Hundreds of thousands more suffered wounds in service. It was during the Civil War that President Abraham Lincoln signed legislation passed by the Congress to establish a Medal of Honor to recognize the heroism and distinguished service of Union sailors, soldiers and marines. In all, a total of 1,522 awards of the Medal of Honor were presented for service during the Civil War.					1

The Mexican-American War (May 13, 1846 – August 2, 1848) America's <i>First Foreign War</i> was declared against Mexico after two decades of dispute over Texas, which had been granted statehood the year before war was officially declared. Two years of bitter combat followed, led first by General Zachary Taylor who was catapulted to a renown that later resulted in his election as US President. Initially the small American force was outnumbered and doomed to failure. When Mexican General Santa Anna delivered a surrender ultimatum to General Taylor, the American commander replied: "Tell him to go to hell." Both sides fought with great courage. Ultimately the Americans took Mexico City on October 12, 1847. The war officially ended the following year with the Treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo with Mexico ceding all rights to Texas and the United States purchasing additional lands that would become the states of Arizona, New Mexico, Nevada, and California.						 1 1941 – A. 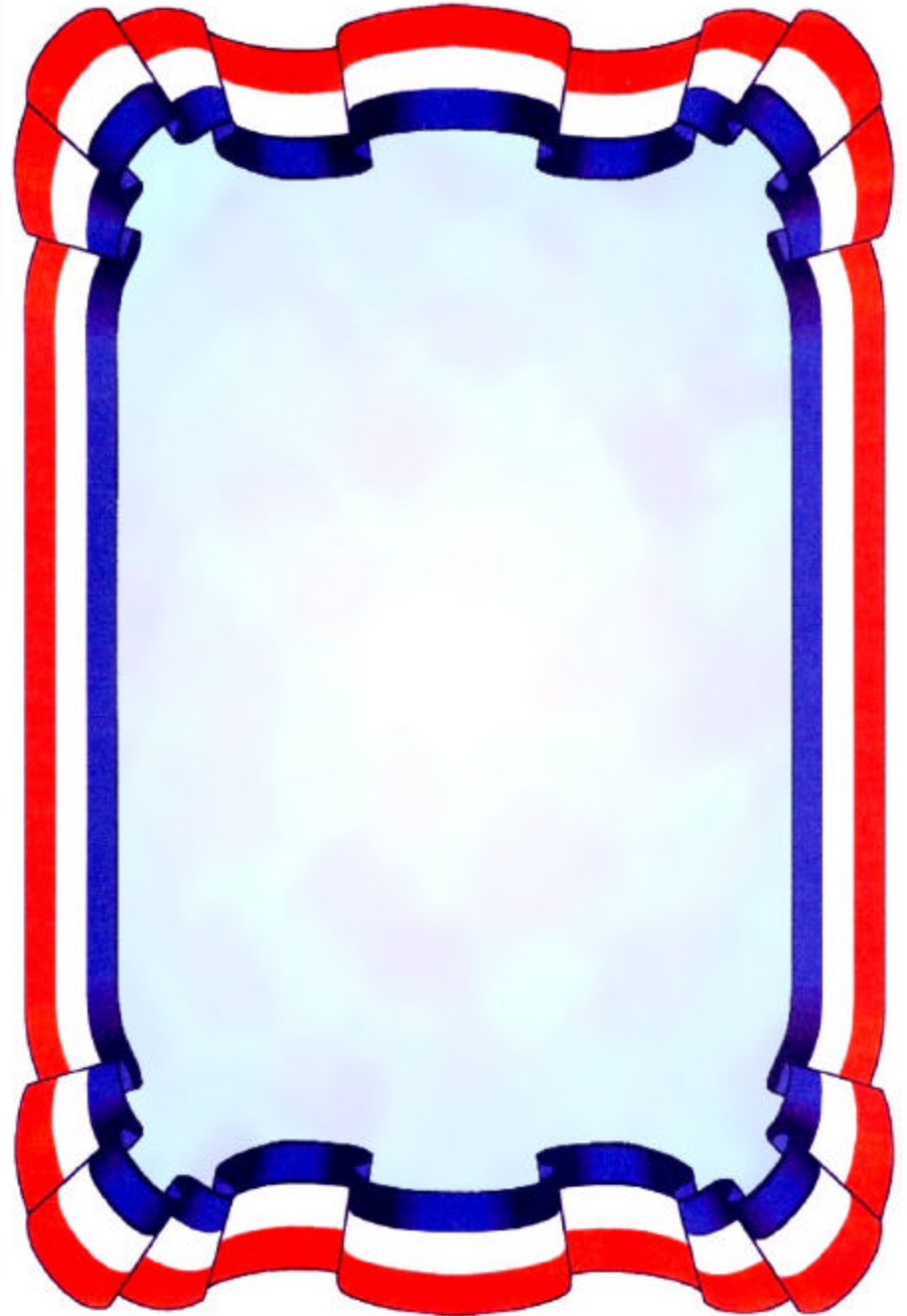

The Medal of Honor, often referred to as the Congressional Medal of Honor, is our Nation's highest award for military heroism. It is awarded only for the highest degree of valor while in Military service against an armed enemy of the United States. Though more than 40 million Americans have served our Nation in uniform since the birth of the United States in 1776, only 3,459 Medals of Honor have been awarded. These heroes are our own unique *Knights of the Round Table*, men of immense loyalty and patriotism who risked their lives in the defense of freedom, and now continue to give of their lives to promote patriotism and inspire other Americans in the spirit of sacrifice and service.

Since the beginning of World War II, only 842 soldiers, sailors, Marines, and airmen have been awarded the Medal of Honor. Nearly two thirds of them died in their moment of heroism. On Veterans Day, 2002 when "The Call of Duty" Calendar became available, only 142 of these TRUE heroes remained. To these heroes, who serve to remind us of ALL the men and women who have risked and given all to secure the blessings of liberty, we dedicate this calendar.
